6th Grade Takes A Closer Look At Mars

This quarter in Science, the 6th grade classes are studying Mars. Here are some facts about the red planet.

To begin, Mars is the fourth planet from the Sun.
Mars is 230 million km from the Sun.

Mars is often called the red planet because it looks red through a telescope. The planet gets its color from iron oxide which results in a light mostly in the red part of the spectrum. Mars is named after a Roman god. Mars is the god of war. When the Romans first saw Mars, they saw the color of blood, and the war god was a perfect fit.

Mars and Earth are rapidly converging, and get 30km closer about every second. Possibly sometime in late summer, Mars will look like a blaze in contrast to the night sky.

Percival Lowell, a famous astronomer (who dis-

covered the Mars canals), once witnessed a close encounter of the two planets sometime in the 19th century. Much later in June, 2003, a man in Tampa, Florida took pictures throughout the summer that show Mars zooming towards earth.

The polar ice cap is part of the reason that Mars can be seen from so far away. The dry ice reflects light off the sun and gives the planet a glowing appearance.



The History of Valentine's Day

There were many saints named Valentine but the most famous one lived in Rome around the year 270. During those years many of the Roman people believed in their old gods, so Christian believers were not able to worship publicly. For Saint Valentine this was a problem because he was a Christian priest. Many of the Christians were imprisoned because of what they believed. Saint Valentine was one of those sent to prison. Oddly enough, he was cheerful in prison where he was said to have cured someone who was blind. Although because of this miracle, he was sentenced to death. He was decapitated on February 14th.

morning after the blaze began, when she was in her barn, that one of their cows kicked over a lantern.

Despite the story about Daisy, one can find good reason to think that poor Mrs. O'Leary and her cow Daisy, were innocent.

This famous disaster began the night of October 8, 1871. Fire-fighters exhausted from fighting a fire the day before, were sent to the wrong neighborhood. By the time they finally got to the O'Leary's, they found the fire raging out of control. It spread East and North. At that time, streets, sidewalks, and many building were made of wood. Wooden houses, commercial and industrial buildings and private mansions were all consumed in the fire. The fire finally died out on


October 10, 1871 after many hours of rain. The fire had destroyed 18,000 buildings and 100,000 of the city's 300,000 people were left homeless. Also, \$200 million worth of property was destroyed and 300 people died.

Shock Bigford & Company selling cigars, tobacco, fruit and cider at old prices is generally credited for being the first retail enterprise to open in the devastated downtown. Later on after the fire, builders developed the use of steel framing for support and they invented the skyscraper in Chicago.

The Great Chicago Fire was one of the most spectacular last events of the 19th century and it is recognized as a major milestone in the city's history.








Student Survey: What Is Your Favorite Color Spring Ave?

Gray Fox and Leatherback Turtle on Endangered List

There are many, many animals on the endangered animal lists for different reasons. There are two animals in this article, one endangered animal is the gray fox, the other one is a leatherback turtle. The first one I will talk about is the gray fox.

The gray fox lives in the mixed wood plains. The gray foxes have their dens in rocks, crevices, caves, hollow logs, hollow trees, stumps, trees and enlarged wood chuck burrows. The gray foxes are rare in Canada, but are a native species there too. Some foxes are also seen by the U.S. border.

They eat wheat, insects, plants, birds, eggs, nuts, but mainly small animals like rabbits. The reason why the gray fox is endangered is because where the foxes live is being polluted, and it is making them rarer and rarer. Also another reason is because manmade and natural threats are causing their extinction. Horned owls, bobcats, and coyotes eat young gray foxes, and hunting too, is causing extinction.



The foxes aren't all gray but only peppery-gray on the top. There is a gray stripe on their back. Their necks and bellies are white and their legs and chest are reddish-orangeish. These foxes have a pointed muzzle and strong necks. Also they have reddish brown on their side. Their tails are bushy and have a black tip. Foxes are members of the dog family. Foxes can climb trees because of their strong hooked claws. They weigh 16 pounds, but the babies weigh only 100 grams. The gray fox is the same size and shape of the red fox but the gray fox has shorter legs and muzzle. They are the size of a small dog. They have pointed ears. Also the gray fox is nocturnal, which means it

is awake at night.

The next animal is the leatherback turtle. They are found in the warm seas, but they migrate. They are the largest turtle in the world. The turtles live in oceans all over the world from Alaska to the southern tip of Africa. They eat small sea animals like jellyfish. The food the turtles eat has to be soft because they have no teeth.

The reason why the leatherback sea turtles are endangered is because of recent hurricanes disturbing the turtles nest and then the eggs won't hatch, but most of the harm comes from people. Hunters hunt them for meat and rob nests. Their regular nests aren't safe because people are building houses on the beaches where the turtles have their nests and the beaches are getting more popular.


The leatherback turtle weighs 1,500 pounds. They have big, strong flippers. The front flippers are powerful and help the turtle swim and the back ones helps them steer. The turtles are reptiles so they lay eggs.



They lay about 100-200 eggs in one nest. The eggs feel soft and rubbery. The females only come to shore every 2-3 years to lay eggs, and they have usually 8-9 nests. The turtles don't care for their eggs after they lay them, instead they cover them up with the sand and go back to the ocean. The eggs hatch after 60 days the baby turtles hurry and go into the ocean. They are 270 cm in size.

Leatherback turtles are named for their rubber-like shell. They nest in Florida in the months of April- June. Leatherback turtles have softer shells than any other turtle. They have no claws, legs, or toes, instead they have flippers. They breathe air. The turtle can stay under water for more than an hour.

Chocolate Dips!

Cook's Tools:

small bowl, wooden spoon, toothpicks, waxed paper, paper candy cups, small saucepan.

You will need:

6 ounces of dark chocolate, cherries, brazil nuts, blanched almonds, walnuts, fresh mandarin orange sections, strawberries, seedless grapes.

Melting the Chocolate

- * Break up the chocolate into a bowl.
- * Heat some water in the saucepan over a

- low heat until it just begins to bubble.
- Keeping the heat on low, place the bowl over the saucepan. Stir the chocolate with the wooden spoon until it completely melts.
- * Turn off the heat. Very carefully move the saucepan and the bowl from the stove to a mat or dish towel.

Creating the chocolate dips

- * One at a time, put a piece of fruit on a toothpick and dip half of it into the chocolate. Then put it on wax paper to dry.
- * Using your fingers, dip the nuts half way into the chocolate, one at a time. Let them dry on the waxed paper.
