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District 105's 3rd Battle of the Books



The score was tied between two teams. The final question book was: "In what book does a cat wearing a hat visit two kids?" The answer is.

This is an example of what Battle of the Books is like. Battle of the Books is a competition where 5th – 8th grade students in the District are asked various questions about books. The participants try to guess the book based on the question. Some questions could be: "In what book does a character go on an adventure in Neverland?" The answer would be Peter Pan. If students say just the title they get one point, but if they say the author too (*which in this case would be James M. Barrie*), the participants get a second point.

Many weeks before the competition students get a list of books titled A, B, C, and D. There are five books on each list and students must read all the books from one list to be eligible to compete. All of the books on the lists are Caudill or Bluestem titles.

After students read the books, they are put onto teams made up of people from different schools in our District. Then the teams are ready to practice and compete.

We asked Seventh Avenue librarian, Mrs. Nestlinger, some questions about Battle of the Books. Mrs. Nestlinger said that Battle of the Books started for District 105 in school year 2009-2010, but many districts across the nation have been doing Battle of the Books for years.

Another thing that Mrs. Nestlinger said was that during the Battle there can be up to thirty questions per book. Mrs. Nestlinger also said that

this year the district librarians will mix up kids from each school that have read the same list to create teams. She said there may be many teams assigned the same list depending on how many kids sign up for the Battle. While the librarians determine how many members are on each team, the kids can decide a team name.

Mrs. Nestlinger told us that many districts, like Chicago, Naperville and other local districts may do the Battle differently but they are all set up to have fun. Finally, Mrs. Nestlinger told us that public and school librarians make the up the questions, but a public librarian asks the questions during the Battle. There were 110 people who participated in Battle of the Books last year, and this year there will be even more!

We think Battle of the Books will be lots of fun, so if you are a fifth grader or over we suggest you try it!!!

The Battle of The Books is on April 19th and we wish all our Spring Avenue readers good luck.

Chicago Food Depository Impacts Lives

Are you familiar with the Chicago Food Depository? A couple of weeks ago I was lucky enough to help out there with my brother's Boy Scout troop. It was an amazing day!

The food depository is Chicago's food bank. It is a non-profit food distribution center. The Chicago Food Depository distributes food through a network of 650 food pantries, soup kitchens, and shelters who feed children and adults. In 2011, the Chicago Food Depository distributed over 69 million pounds of food which included 18 million pounds of fresh produce.

Where does all this food come from? The food comes from several sources: 48% comes from donations from food companies which include retailers, wholesalers and foodservice organizations, and people like you and me, 15% is strategically purchased, and 37% comes from government programs. Each week the Chicago Food Depository feeds 142,000 people, which includes families all throughout Cook County.

When I was there I was put in a group that repacked individual instant oatmeal packages into bags of 10 that were then packaged in boxes of 20. It was a very hands on job!! In



the few hours we were there we repacked over 16,000 individual packets of oatmeal. By the end of the day I felt so good because we helped so many people.

We did this in a warehouse 3 times the size of Costco, filled from floor to ceiling with pallets of food. When asked "if all donations stopped tomorrow, how long would the current inventory of food last," the answer was 2 months. You can understand why the volunteers and donations are so important.

If you are interested in volunteering they do group volunteering for ages 5-13 once every month. You have to be 14 or older to be a regular volunteer. The Chicago Food Depository is focused on providing food for hungry people, while striving to end hunger in our communities. Teacher opinions



The Fun Fair is Friday March 16th from 6:00pm-8:30pm. Hope to see you and your family there!



HOMEMADE MARSHMALLOWS

Recipe from <http://www.foodnetwork.com/recipes/alton-brown/homemade-marshmallows-recipe/index.html>

Ingredients

3 packages unflavored gelatin
 1 cup ice cold water, divided
 12 ounces granulated sugar, approximately 1 1/2 cups
 1 cup light corn syrup
 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt
 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
 1/4 cup confectioners' sugar
 1/4 cup cornstarch
 Nonstick spray



Directions

Place the gelatin into the bowl of a stand mixer along with 1/2 cup of the water. Have the whisk attachment standing by.

In a small saucepan combine the remaining 1/2 cup water, granulated sugar, corn syrup and salt. Place over medium high heat, cover and allow to cook for 3 to 4 minutes. Uncover, clip a candy thermometer onto the side of the pan and continue to cook until the mixture reaches 240 degrees F, approximately 7 to 8 minutes. Once the mixture reaches this temperature, immediately remove from the heat.

Turn the mixer on low speed and, while running, slowly pour the sugar syrup down the side of the bowl into the gelatin mixture. Once you have added all of the syrup, increase the speed to high. Continue to whip until the mixture becomes very thick and is luke-warm, approximately 12 to 15 minutes. Add the vanilla during the last minute of whipping. While the mixture is whipping prepare the pans as follows.

FOR REGULAR MARSHMALLOWS:

Combine the confectioners' sugar and cornstarch in a small bowl. Lightly spray a 13 by 9-inch metal baking pan with nonstick cooking spray. Add the sugar and cornstarch mixture and move around to completely coat the bottom and sides of the pan. Return the remaining mixture to the bowl for later use.

When ready, pour the mixture into the prepared pan, using a lightly oiled spatula for spreading evenly into the pan. Dust the top with enough of the remaining sugar and cornstarch mixture to lightly cover. Reserve the rest for later. Allow the marshmallows to sit uncovered for at least 4 hours and up to overnight.

Turn the marshmallows out onto a cutting board and cut into 1-inch squares using a pizza wheel dusted with the confectioners' sugar mixture. Once cut, lightly dust all sides of each marshmallow with the remaining mixture, using additional if necessary. Store in an airtight container for up to 3 weeks.

FOR MINIATURE MARSHMALLOWS:

Combine the confectioners' sugar and cornstarch in a small bowl. Line 4 half sheet pans with parchment paper, spray the paper with nonstick cooking spray and dust with the confectioners' sugar mixture.

Scoop the mixture into a piping bag fitted with a 1/2-inch round piping tip. Pipe the mixture onto the prepared sheet pans lengthwise, leaving about 1-inch between each strip. Sprinkle the tops with enough of the remaining cornstarch and sugar mixture to lightly cover. Let the strips set for 4 hours or up to overnight.

Cut into 1/2 inch pieces using a pizza wheel or scissors dusted with the confectioners' sugar mixture. Once cut, lightly dust all sides of each marshmallow with the remaining sugar mixture and store in an airtight container for up to a week.
