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Sixth Graders Travel to Vulcan Quarry

BOOM! That was an explosion at the Vulcan Quarry. Vulcan Quarry is a limestone quarry.

Vulcan searches for limestone to put in sidewalks, driveways, and streets. Vulcan is the nation's largest producer of construction aggregates, which are small pieces of broken down rock. Vulcan makes crushed stone, sand, and gravel that are used in almost all forms of construction.

In 2007, they sold \$3 million dollars worth of their material. They have about 11,000 employees companywide. There are 250 schools that go to Vulcan through the K-12 Adopt-A-School program. Over 44,000 people took the bus tour down into

the Quarry in 2007, most of them were children. More than 41,000 children and adults visit the Quarry each year. Vulcan Quarry is 300 feet deep and a mile wide. In Vulcan you can learn about anything you need to about limestone.

The Spring Ave. 6th grade classes took a field trip to Vulcan this Fall. There were 4 parts to the trip: A bus tour of the pit, one class explaining what Vulcan does, another class talking about how they will reclaim the land after they are done mining, and a class where they did an experiment. One part was

taking a bus tour into the pit where all the explosions oc-

The classes were interesting, and we did fun experiments that taught us about how to separate the different sizes of rock, and how Vulcan makes sure that the water they use is cleaned and doesn't get polluted.

Lastly, we went to another class explaining how Vulcan reclaims land after they are done mining it.

Vulcan is an important part of our community. Now you know a little more about what happens when you hear the booms.


Dragons, Shades, and Kings, Oh My!

read about great heroes and noble kings.







Cooking Corner: Big Blueberry Muffins

Equipment:

measuring cups & spoons, cutting board & table knife, small saucepan & pot holder, wooden spoon & table fork, paper liners & 12-cup muffin pan, mixing bowls, rubber spatula, large spoon & toothpick, oven mitts & cooling racks.

Ingredients:

1 ½ cups butter (2 ½ sticks), cut into three equal pieces 2 cups of all purpose flour, 1 ½ cups plus 2 teaspoons of sugar,

1 tablespoon of baking powder, 1 ½ teaspoons of salt, 1 cup of milk,

1 egg,

3/4 teaspoon of vanilla extract, 1 cup of blueberries, rinsed and dried.

Directions:

Put the butter pieces in the small saucepan and set over medium heat. Stir with the wooden spoon until melted, 1 to 2 minutes.

Using the pot holder, remove the pan from the heat and set it aside to cool.

Preheat the oven to 375 degrees Fahrenheit.

Put the paper liners in the 12 muffin cups.

In medium mixing bowl, combine the flour, ½ cup sugar, baking powder and salt. Mix with the tablespoon.

In a small mixing bowl, combine the milk, egg, and vanilla. Using the same fork, beat until well blended.

Add the milk mixture, melted butter, and blueberries to the flour mixture. Using the rubber spatula, stir gently until the ingredients are just blended.

Spoon equal amounts of the batter into the muffin cups.

Sprinkle the extra 2 teaspoons of sugar evenly over the tops.

Bake the muffins until they are golden and have risen nicely, 18 to 20 minutes.

To test, insert the toothpick into the center of a muffin. If it comes out clean, the muffins are ready. Using oven mitts, remove the muffin pan from oven and place it on the cooling rack.

Let the muffins cool for at least 15 minutes before removing them from the pan.

Gently turn the pan over, letting the muffins fall out on to the
