We are busy and getting busier! We are happy to
write you about some exciting
changes for which we are planning now!

As you may know, we are finalizing plans with our school board to add new class-rooms onto our school. The construction bids are being approved and we hope to be moving ahead this spring. I will be writing additional notes to be placed in your Wednesday envelope with more details as they become available.

For now, please know that our architect and construction committees (made up of staff and parents) are planning ways to make this a learning experience that is as positive as possible. By learning about demolition and construction we hope to help students be a part of "building the future!"

We will have a ground-breaking ceremony and include our newspaper crew for reporting and taking pictures along the way. We will be updating our website so you may be a part of this as well. Please contact me if you would like to be included on this committee as you learn more information. Committee Chairs are Mrs. Webb and Ms. Marek.

In addition, we are developing a Playground Committee that will also include students, staff and parents to begin planning stages for our new playground. Please help us with safety in the morning. Your child is not supposed to arrive before 8:20 and many students are coming to school much earlier. Students will be asked to wait outside the front doors or at the backdoor until 8:20, at which point they may enter the building for accelerated math class or to wait for the morning kick off. If students are on safety patrol, we ask that they arrive at 8:10 so they can be at their posts by 8:15.

Lunchtime is another area where we need some help from you. Students should always consult the menu before ordering a hot lunch. They will be asked to eat their hot lunch if they order this. At times, students do not care for the entrée after trying it, so we offer them the other items on the tray as well as an additional fruit or item from the trays as they become available. We reserve peanut butter and jelly sandwiches for those emergency situations where a student does not have any lunch.

Please double check with your child as they look over the menu and choose hot lunches. The good news is that they are healthier and much more desirable to most students.

We are extremely grateful for all the hard work that our PTO does in so many areas. We have committed parents that care about our school and the children. Teachers wrote creative grants to submit to the PTO so they could utilize funds to teach students with additional resources and services.

200 - Already? Celebrating the life of Abraham Lincoln


even score and sixty years ago, Abraham Lincoln, the sixteenth President of the United States, was born! President Lincoln was born to Thomas and Nancy Lincoln on February 12, 1809, in a small log cabin in Hardin County, Kentucky. He had an older sister who cared about him a lot, Sally Lincoln. He was small then, but would grow to be on of the biggest, most respected people around.

When Lincoln was nine years old, his mother, Nancy, became very ill and died. A year later, Abraham's Father married Sarah Johnson, who was now Abraham's step-mother.

When Lincoln grew up, he was a lawyer, a postmaster, a boatman, a farm hand and a surveyor. Lincoln got married to Mary Todd. Then, finally in 1834, he got into politics.

From 1834-1842, Lincoln served in the Illinois State Legislature in 1847, became part of the House of Representatives, and in 1860 Abraham Lincoln took on the highest office in America – the President of the United States of America.

In 1861, the Civil War broke out between the North side of America and the South side of America. This

war was mainly over one issue – slavery. The North wanted to abolish slavery, while the South wanted to keep slavery going. In 1863, Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation, a document stating it is illegal for Southern states to have slaves. Later in 1863, Lincoln also gave one of the most famous speeches ever – the Gettysburg Address. The address said many things about the Civil War.

In 1864, Lincoln ran for President again. This time, it would be hard to get reelected, because Lincoln was disliked by the South because of the Civil War and his antislavery actions. However, Lincoln won the Presidency again.

In his second term, the Civil War ended. Five days after the war ended, a plan was made by John Wilkes Booth and some friends. They were going to assassinate President Abraham Lincoln, Vice President Andrew Johnson, Secretary of State William Seward, and Civil War General Ulysses Grant, who would become the 18th president in 1869. All these events were supposed to take place that night, but George Atzerodt, who was supposed to get Andrew Johnson, drank too much and forgot about the task.

Lewis Powell alias, Paine, who was supposed to assassinate William Seward, attempted but failed to slay Seward. General Grant did not go to the theatre that night with Lincoln, like he was supposed to. Booth was going to assassinate Grant at the theater. The only successful assassination in the plot was against President Lincoln.

The country mourned the death of their beloved President Lincoln. First Lady Mary Todd Lincoln went crazy over her husband's death. Abraham Lincoln is now considered the best president of the United States by some historians.

Rules, by Cynthia Lord is a great novel for third through sixth graders. This book is a Newbery Honor Award and won the Schneider Family Book Award.



I would rate this book a 5 out of 5 bookmarks because this author uses descriptive words and paragraphs that are kid friendly.


This book teaches us that everyone is a person even if they have a disability. This weeks book is rated:

Make your own Pinecone Birdfeeder



Supplies:

Pine cone

Butter knife (*parent supervision needed when handling!) smooth peanut butter

Birdseed sturdy string

scissors

Steps:

- 1) Cut a long length of string to hang the bird feeder.
- 2) Attach the string to the pinecone, by looping it around the pinecone a few sections down from the top. Leave a loop at the top to hang.
- 3) Place the pinecone on a hard surface that can get dirty.
- 4) Using the butter knife, spread the peanut butter inside and around the edges of the pinecone. Use plenty of peanut butter and make sure to cover every part!
- 5) Sprinkle the birdseed on the pinecone until all of the peanut butter is covered.
- 6) Hang your bird feeder on a tree branch.

Now you can do some bird watching while the birds enjoy their treat!

Puppy Chow Snack Mix

1 bag (12 oz.) chocolate chips

February is National Children's Dental Health Month



National Children's Dental Health Month (NCDHM) turns 60 this year.

Each February, since 1949, the American Dental Association (ADA) has sponsored National Children's Dental Health Month to raise awareness about the importance of oral health.

"Turn Up Your Smile Power" is this year's theme for National Dental Health Month. Three of the most important habits parents can encourage in their children for a lifetime of healthy smiles are:

- 1. Brush teeth twice a day.
- Introduce brushing by the age of two.
- Flossing teeth is important to dental health.
- 2. Visit the dentist every 6 months to ensure good oral

health

- Visit the dentist six months after the eruption of first tooth
- Tooth decay is still the most common chronic childhood disease, five times as common as asthma with poor oral health resulting in 52 million missed school hours.
- Tooth decay can occur at any age including in the very young and if left untreated, can negatively impact a child's ability to eat, speak, sleep and learn.
- 3. Make mouth guards a part of any sport activity
- 5 million teeth are knocked out each year. Many of these injuries could have been prevented by having a child wear a mouth guard during sports activities.
- Mouth guards help protect a child's teeth from being knocked out, chipped or broken and can save a child from needing oral surgery to replace a tooth.



Developing good habits at an early age and scheduling regular dental visits helps children get a good start on a lifetime of healthy teeth and gums.

The State of Illinois requires dental exams for ALL children in Kindergarten, 2nd and 6th grade by May 15th, 2009.

SECOND GRADERS used cut paper to make toy soldiers that correlated with their field trip to the Nutcracker. We just finished learning about perspective with our "Trees in Snow" pictures. We are currently working on Chinese dragons to wish everyone good luck in the new year.



THIRD GRADERS used simple printmaking techniques to make holiday poinsettias. We then began to look at the art of Grandma Moses and discuss how she made her scenes look as though they are going back into the distance; we then made our own versions of a snowy landscape.

FOURTH GRADERS began their study of pattern by weaving with felt strips. We then took the completed weaving and made them into pillows with the help of Mrs. Stavrou and some 7th grade students. We are now weaving small wallhangings.


